



MEDem Steering Committee

Hajo Boomgaarden (University of Vienna)

Hajo Boomgaarden is Professor of Methods in the Social Sciences at the Department of Communication and Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences at the University of Vienna. His research focuses on various aspects of political communication and on the application of computational social science methods.

Sylvia Kritzinger (University of Vienna)

Sylvia Kritzinger is Professor of Methods in the Social Sciences at the Department of Government at the University of Vienna. Her research focuses on political behavior, democratic representation, and political participation. She was involved in the 7th Framework Programmes of the European Commission PIREDEU and ELECDEM.

Lorenzo De Sio (LUISS, Rome)

Lorenzo De Sio is a professor at the Department of Political Science of LUISS Guido Carli University, Rome. He is a member of the Italian National Election Studies (ITANES), participated in "True European Voter", "EU Profiler", "euandi", and is now the principal investigator of the Issue Competition Comparative Project (ICCP) and the POSTGEN project.

Alexia Katsanidou (GESIS, Cologne)

Alexia Katsanidou holds the Chair of Empirical Social Research at the University of Cologne. As scientific director at GESIS – Leibniz Institute for the Social Sciences, she has extensive knowledge of scientific infrastructures, and developing services for the scientific community on open science, data management, and data linking.

Georg Lutz (FORS, Lausanne)

Georg Lutz is director of FORS and professor of political science at the University of Lausanne. Before he was principal investigator of the Swiss election study Selects for many years. His work focuses on political institutions and political behavior in a comparative perspective, as well as Swiss politics and survey research methods.

Henrik Oscarsson (University of Gothenburg)

Henrik Oscarsson is a professor in political science with electoral studies and research director for the Swedish National Election Studies (SNES) at the Department of Political Science, University of Gothenburg, Sweden. Current projects involve research on knowledge resistance, political partisanship and political polarization.

Wouter van Atteveldt (VU Amsterdam)

Wouter van Atteveldt is a professor of computational communication science and political communication at VU Amsterdam and director of the VU Societal Analytics lab. He has co-founded the journal Computational Communication Research and the ICA Computational Methods division. He is part of various (inter-)national infrastructure and computational social science projects.
